Muslims and the cultural backlash of globalisation

One of the most widely discussed concepts and developments in the present world is globalisation. While it will mean different things to different people the closest semblance to a general view about it is 'interdependence' or 'coming together' or even 'exchange' at a global scale.

It could mean for instance, that many of us would be driving cars whose engines are made in Japan, some of its other components in Indonesia because of cheap labour, and running on petrol coming from Saudi Arabia etc.

The Japanese economy will benefit from the current export climate that enables its manufactured cars to be sold here in New Zealand and elsewhere in the world. The same thing goes for the Saudis and other oil exporting states.

Technologically and economically therefore, there are no such 'pure' nations who live an exclusive existence. There is global interdependence.

Culturally too, the 21st century climate that made automobiles, goods and oil etc produced in one place to be available everywhere has meant religion and people are no longer confined to one location. Anyone who does not understand or appreciate this is either living 'another' world or simply suffering some malady.

Unfortunately time and time, one as a Muslim gets reminded about the contradictions or backlash of globalisation.

The most recent one is the July 22nd mass murder of

innocent people most of them very young, in Norway. The alleged perpetrator of this most recent act of terrorism, which, by the way, is yet to be given any prefix by the media, is 32-year-old Anders Behring Breivik.

The reasons he gave for his actions that took the lives of about 70 people is, among others that, he abhors 'Muslim migration and multiculturalism' in Europe and wants to see Europe becoming as pure as Japan and Korea.

Neither Japan nor Korea will be pleased to be described as 'pure' in Breivik's sense of the word precisely because if they were to remain so they would have to shut themselves out of the 21st century phenomenon of globalisation. They would have neither markets for their automobiles nor the oil required to drive them.

Globalisation among others, also imply that religion, as a cultural form has no fixed territory. It can have an area of greater concentration only. For instance, there would be more Christians in Europe and more Muslims in Middle East etc but these religions and their followers are also everywhere and will continue to be.

The movement of goods is real, the movement of people is real and so is the interdependence of world economies.

In the same way, cultural de-territorialization is real and to react to it violently is to be unreal.

To the extent that there are such unrealistic and irrational people around the world brings enormous challenge to us as Muslims. It means more effort is required from us to explain ourselves and especially explain the religion. In the end, Allah guides whom He wishes.



In the past two years we have held meetings in most of the centres where members get together have meals together, discuss issues and disperse. We have also invited Police, Auckland Council Officers, Auckland District Board members and other to come and talk to us on different issues.


The MCA is still in its infancy and a lot of work is required to be done to make it a success. It is all about uniting the Muslims at regional level so we can work together. May Allaah help and guide us all.

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LOOKING AHEAD

FIANZ reviewed and amended its Constitution recently making provision for formation of regional Councils. The aim is to create a greater contact with muslims at grass roots level, wherever they live in New Zealand. When FIANZ was established in 1978 there were only three or four Associations throughout New Zealand which came together to establish FIANZ. The reality now is that we have so many organisations in various regions running and maintaining Islamic centres and massajid and providing service to the community. The largest region is Auckland. And now this is expanding in other regions as well. Although most of these organisations are Trusts, they do keep in touch with the local community who attend this Centres regularly.

Perhaps in the next ten to fifteen years the present structure of FIANZ may need to change to accommodate representation through the regional bodies to give more say to the community in the affairs of FIANZ which is the nationally recognised body for Muslims in New Zealand.

BEAUTY OF EID

After a month of fasting comes Eid ul Fitr, a great day for world Muslims. It is a day of happiness, celebration, generosity and unity. Let us share few words about the beauty of Eid in this essay Insha Allah.

WHY HAPPINESS?

The main reason for happiness is the promise of reward and forgiveness from Allah after the hard work in the fasting month. Muslims fast by the day and stand for long prayer during the night for the pleasure of Allah. Eid day is the pay day for that hard work. According to a hadis, narrated by Hazrat Anas (R.A) that holy prophet (SAW) said that on Eid day, Allah (SWT) makes an announcement before angels about the hard working Muslims and that is:

"Today I will accept their supplications, then say here you go, I have forgiven your shortcomings and changed your bad deeds into good deeds." (Baihaqi)

Allah's forgiveness takes Muslims one step closer

to the Paradise, the place of everlasting happiness in next life. That is the most important reason for happiness on Eid day for Muslims.

HOW DO WE CELEBRATE?

For happy occasion, Muslims celebrate in a unique way. The most important aspects of our celebration come from the teaching of Quran and Sunnah.

We can look at an example from Holy Quran. When Allah (SWT) informed the near victory of Islam and Muslims in Makkah, it was very happy news indeed. Then Allah (SWT) also informed the proper way of celebration. Al-Quran-110

"When Help of Allah and victory (of Makkah) comes, and you (O prophet) see the people enter Allah's religion in groups. Then CELEBRATE the Praises of your Lord, and pray for forgiveness from Him."

Another example: When Allah granted the Fountain for holy Prophet (SAW), it was happy news indeed. Then Allah taught holy prophet how to celebrate it in Holy Quran (108:1-2) "To you (O Prophet) We have granted the Fountain (Of abundance), Therefore turn to your Lord in

prayer and sacrifice"

From these two examples we can see the Islamic way of celebration is unique in the sense that:

- (a) We perform a special Eid prayer to show we are His humble servants and we thank Him in the special way He taught us through His Holy prophet (SAW). In this prayer we praise Him, we seek forgiveness and we seek all the goodness in this world and the world here after from Him.
- (b) We celebrate His glory by saying ALLAHU AKBAR Takbir
- (c) We sacrifice money, food to share with the needy Muslims as Zakat ul Fitr in this Eid and so on. It is a practise of generosity and looking after the less privileged.

HOW DOES IT UNITE MUSLIMS?

Islam is a religion of unity and peace. Its main purpose is to abolish discrimination, violence, racism and so on. Islam calls all Muslims in the locality to come together and pray as a united body, side by side peacefully. All Muslims share one thing in that process and that is worshipping Allah only.

After prayer, they embrace one another,

forgive one another freely and, as a result enjoy the flow of happiness, joy and peace. They pray not just for themselves but for the rest of the Muslims and for the rest of the mankind.

This divine unity through the belief in one Allah is so precious that money can not buy it. So Eid is training for unity that Allah has ordered Muslims to have. Al Quran 3.103

"And hold fast, all of you together by the Rope which Allah (Stretches out for you), and do not be divided among yourselves (being Muslims)"

HOW THE HAPPINESS SPREADS?

The joy then continues to other levels. Muslims prepare nice foods for the family and then invite other friends and families to share the food and happiness. We share our foods with our neighbours regardless of their faith as a nice gesture of sharing happiness, peace and harmony.

So the beauty of Eid brings spiritual, physical, social happiness and joy for Muslims and for the humanity. Eid teaches Muslims to be God fearing, to be peaceful and harmonious with all. Is not that wonderful!

Eid a day of thanksgiving

NO sooner does the first moon of Shawwal appear in the western horizon than Muslims all over the world break into the chants of Takbeer, gesturing the festival of Eid Al Fitr.

"Allahu Akbar, Allahu Akbar, Lailah Illa Allah, Allahu Akbar, Allahu Akbar, Walillahil Hamdu" which means "Allah is the Most Great; there is no deity to worship but Allah. Allah is the Most Great and to Allah goes all praises."

All deeds, including the festivals in Islam, are performed by Muslims in accordance with the directive of Allah. In

view of that, Muslims are getting ready to celebrate Eid Al Fitr after the successful completion of Ramadan fasting.

God says:

"He wants that you must complete the same number (of days) and that you must magnify Allah (ie to

say Takbeer (Allahu Akbar; Allah is the Most Great) for having guided you so that you must be grateful to Him (2:185).

All believing men and women, boys and girls, start enjoying with seventh heaven at the very sight of the first moon of Shawwal.

The boys and girls, who dream about the day of Eid long before the first moon of Shawwal comes into view, find pleasure in burning the midnight oil on the penultimate night of Eid to beautify their bands and feet with henna.

While Muslims celebrate Eid, they cannot but rejoice it as a symbol of thanksgiving and jubilation to Allah for giving them the chance and strength to carry out the moral, spiritual and physical test during Ramadan.

To tell you the truth, Ramadan equips Muslims to swim in the roughest seas of life. All their organs observe fasting by turning down all sorts of illicit pleasures.

The celebration of Eid Al Fitr starts with the distribution of Zakat Al Fitr without which Muslims can't fulfil its spiritual significance. This should be distributed before going to the prayer ground.

"Indeed whosoever purifies himself (by avoiding polytheism and accepting Islamic monotheism) shall achieve success, and remembers (glorifies) the name of his Lord and prays". (87:14-15)

By distributing Zakat Al Fitr, Muslims cleanse themselves in body, mind, and soul which make them fit to see and proclaim the Glory of God. That leads them to the absorption in praise and prayer.

Zakat Al Fitr aims at the total eradication of poverty of the Muslim destitute on the day of Eid. In addition, it will make up for the idle deeds and shameful talks committed

by the distributor of Zakat Al Fitr during his fasting days. It also acts as a cord between rich and the poor within the Islamic community.

Islam wants its followers to live as a model and justly balance society who would witness over the other communities and as such they cannot treat festivals as an occasion to take a vacation from Islamic responsibilities and commitments.

It is the tradition of the Prophet (Peace Be Upon Him) to give charity, visit relatives and the sick and pray for the people who suffer for various reasons on the day of Eid celebration. This does not mean that Muslims are prohibited from making merry on the day of Eid. They can, but without shedding its holiness.

Aysha, the wife of the Prophet, said: "Allah's Messenger entered my house when I had two girls singing the songs of Bu'aath (pre-Islamic war lore) and beating on a duff; so he lay down on the bed and turned his face away. Then Abubacker (Father) came in and scolded me saying, 'The flutes of Shytan played in the presence of Allah's Messenger? So, Allah's Messenger turned towards him and said, 'leave them alone, O Abubacker! Every people have a Eid, and this is our Eid". (Bukari)

Eid is also a valuable occasion for Muslims to take pledge with the Almighty to revitalise the spirit of mental and physical training which they have had during Ramadan fasting so that humanity will be able to reap the fruits of a peaceful life.

Wish you all happy and prosperous Eid Mubarak.
