

Players told to tap Halal Ingredients Market

KUALA LUMPUR -- Halal industry players should tap the halal ingredients sector as Muslim consumers worldwide demand checks on animalbased ingredients, the Prime Minister's wife Datin Paduka Seri Rosmah Mansor said last week.

She said the complexity of ingredients integrated into pharmaceutical products and food ingredients like gelatine, enzymes and emulsifiers used in daily cooking and food preparation have come under close scrutiny and debate.

"As such, it is crucial for additional Syariahcompliant halal ingredients be made available to fulfil the needs of these more conscious consumers," Rosmah said in her closing remarks at the 3rd World

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
Halal Research Summit (WHRS) 2010.

3. Academic dinners hosted by University/ Polytechnic/Wanaga/Muslim Students' Associations

To be held at Auckland, Hamilton, Palmerston North, Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin.

Each MSA will invite faculty members from their institution to attend a dinner that will enable them to meet and interact with Muslim students and learn more about them and their experiences. Other activities will also be organised on campuses to coincide with the dinners or on separate days. FIANZ will contribute \$500 to each MSA that participates in this year's IAW activities on campus.

4. Cultural Fairs and Arts Workshops at Masajid

The simultaneous Masajid Open Days, featuring static displays, seminars and tours, have been a successful feature of previous Islam Awareness Weeks and are worthy of greater resources. This will be continued this year.

5. Other activities

Each centre can add other flavours to the activities it is organising as it sees fit. If any centre comes up with a creative activity that other centres can benefit from, the idea should be shared.

Islam is the new religion in Chiapas

ore and more Mayan and Tzotzil people in the Mexican state Chiapas are becoming Muslims. It's fifteen years since the Zapatista uprising in Chiapas and the region has undergone some profound changes. One of them is the emergence of Islam as a new religion in the state. The Muslim community, dominated by converted Mayans and Tzotzils, is slowly gaining ground.

Molino de los Arcos is one of the poorest neighbourhoods of San Cristóbal de las Casas, the second largest city in Chiapas and popular with tourists for its colonial beauty. The barrio is ethnically almost entirely indigenous, with Tzotzil Mayan as the dominant language. On Fridays, though, you can hear the slow, monotonous Arab chants of Muslim prayer. In a wooden shack, painted with Arab religious phrases, some twenty Tzotzil Muslim families have established a small

place of worship.

"This is where we cleanse our spirits and pray to Allah. Not everyone came today, some people have to work," Imam Salvador Lopez Lopez smiles. "But we are doing well. Our community is still small, we are maybe two hundred, but little by little we're growing."

Lopez converted to Islam in 1995 and adopted the Arab name of Muhammad Amin. He was one of the first Tzotzils to embrace the religion. He describes his conversion as a tough, two-year period of soul searching. "There is a lot of ignorance in Chiapas about Islam. Nobody really knew what it was and at first I myself wasn't sure it was the thing for me. My family didn't agree with it either at first. It was hard."

There have always been Muslims in Mexico, but they were usually immigrants from Muslim countries in Africa and the Middle East. It wasn't until 1995, when

Spanish Muslims led by Aureliano Pérez left for Mexico to spread the word of Allah, that Mexicans themselves started converting to Islam.

The arrival of the Spanish can be seen in direct relation to the uprising of the Zapatista rebels in Chiapas, in 1994. They saw the impoverished state as fertile ground for the principles of Islam. Indigenous Mayans and Tzotzils have led marginalised lives ever

since the Spanish conquest in the 16th century. They live in extreme poverty, suffer exploitation by corrupt governments and racism by white and mestizo Mexicans (people with mixed European and Native American racial origin). Alcoholism among indigenous Mexicans is rampant.

The Mayans and Tzotzils belong to the Murabitun movement within Sunni Islam, which upholds a strict ban on the use of alcohol and profits made on money lending. It has proven to be attractive to indigenous Chiapanecos as a viable alternative to capitalism. Yet Muhammad Amin stresses that Islam is not just for indigenous Chiapanecos: "Allah makes no distinction between race. We welcome everyone."

The social component in

Chiapaneco Islam did present itself in its early days though, when the Muslims under Nafia offered to support the Zapatista rebels of Subcomandante Marcos. Many Zapatista rebels, who fight for indigenous rights and land reform, are Tzotzils. A number of them did convert, even though Marcos was hesitant at first. The Mexican government was alarmed and started monitoring the presence of Islam. Former president Vicente

Fox even accused them of having links with Al-Qaeda, although solid proof was never presented.

Muhammad Amin chuckles when he refers to these accusations. "We have no links whatsoever with any foreign group of Muslims, and we have no problem with any other religion here. Islam means peace, we respect everyone around us."

That doesn't mean that Christians responded positively to their new competitors. Andrés Ferrer, who now goes by

the Arab name of Muyahid, converted to Islam in 1998. He's had to overcome a lot of

prejudice:

"Many people reacted badly, because they have no idea what Islam is. Some of them even called us terrorists. My own family called me crazy!"

Despite the opposition Islam is doing well in Chiapas. The Muslims have opened a madrasah or Qur'an school, an Islamic mission, a carpenter's shop and a pizza restaurant. They teach Arabic to new converts and even organize the hajj or pilgrimage to Mecca, which many indigenous Muslims have already undertaken. Islam is growing slowly but surely, says Imam Lopez:

"In this particular mosque there are seventeen Islamic families now. Gradually more people are opening themselves up to the word of Allah. Yes, I think we are here to stay."-- Source: http://www.rnw.nl

Israel must avoid further violations of international law in East Jerusalem: UN

GENEVA, June 29 -- UN Special Rapporteur Richard Falk urged Israel on Tuesday to prevent further violations of international law in East Jerusalem, most urgently in relation to the situation of four Palestinians threatened with the loss of their right of residence and the Mayor of Jerusalem's plan to demolish 22 buildings, representing 89 Palestinian homes, in the Silwan area of East Jerusalem.

"These actions, if carried out, would violate international law, with certain

actions potentially amounting to war crimes under international humanitarian law," warned the independent expert designated by the UN Human Rights Council to monitor the situation of human rights in Palestinian territories occupied since 1967, "It is disturbing that Israel is considering revoking the residency permits of Muhammad Abu-Teir, Ahmad Attoun, Muhammad Totah, and Khaled Abu Arafeh, all current or former members of the Palestinian Legislative Council and long-time residents of East Jerusalem, especially since the Israeli High Court of Justice is scheduled to consider their case on 6 September," the Special Rapporteur noted.

"What is particularly shocking is that Israel appears ready to forcibly transfer these individuals based on their supposed lack of loyalty to the State of Israel," Mr. Falk said. "Israel, as an occupying Power, is prohibited from transferring civilian persons from East Jerusalem,

and is prohibited from forcing Palestinians to swear allegiance or otherwise affirm their loyalty to the State of Israel."

The UN independent expert warned that population transfers in or from occupied territory are war crimes under both the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court and customary international law.

"Those responsible could be liable for war crimes for forcibly transferring these persons, as well as for violations of a wide range of international human rights, rights that protect the family and family life, freedom of expression, freedom

of assembly and association, non-discrimination, and political participation."

"Forcibly transferring these individuals would constitute serious violations of Israel's legal obligations. At the same time, the current threats should be viewed as part of a larger, extremely worrying pattern of Israeli efforts to drive Palestinians out of East Jerusalem - all of which are illegal under international law," stated the Special Rapporteur.

"This situation should be seen within the context of Israel's persistent, systematic approach to driving Palestinians out of East Jerusalem," Mr. Falk added, "including by denying them permission to construct homes, declaring their homes illegal, forcibly removing families, and then destroying their homes - all to make way for Israeli settlements."—Source: KUNA

Progress in Data collection on Hajj and history of the Two Holy Mosques

Riyadh, June 26 -- Working teams for building a data base for the project of Hajj and the Two Holy Mosques Encyclopedia are steadily working under the supervision of King Abdul-Aziz Foundation for Research and Archives for the completion of the project within three years.

The working teams are collecting data from historical sources from all Muslim countries and the rest of the world about Hajj and the history of the Two Holy Mosques from the pre-Islamic era up to the current time. Workshops were held in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Morocco and Malaysia

for this purpose.

Dr Fahd Al-Samari, the Secretary General of King Abdulaziz Foundation for Research and Archives, said work is underway for the implementation of the project under the supervision of Prince Salman ibn Abdulaziz, the Governor of Riyadh Province and Chairman of the Board of Directors of King Abdul-Aziz Foundation for Research and Archives. Dr Al-Samari pointed out to the existing cooperation between the Foundation and other governmental authorities like the Institute of the Two Holy Mosques for Hajj research, an affiliate of Ummal Qura University, and the Higher Education Ministry for carrying out the project.--Source: SPA
