nation'.

While acknowledging the role played by FIANZ in the positive integration of Muslims into wider society PM Key also opined that FIANZ has been of great assistance in enhancing our trade especially with countries in the Islamic world.

Jeddah, 01 Shawwal 19 August (IINA) – The Secretary General of the Organization of the Islamic Cooperation (OIC) Prof. Ekmeleddin Ihsanoglu expressed his warmest congratulations and best wishes to the entire Muslim Ummah on the occasion of Eid Al-Fitr.

Following is the full text of his message: "In these blessed days when the Muslim world is celebrating the happy occasion of Eid Al-Fitr, which is an opportunity for joy and a time to express our thanks and praise to Allah for having bestowed on us the blessings of fasting and praying, I would like to express to the Muslim Úmmah my sincere wishes on this occasion, praying to Almighty Allah that He may make this Eid one of goodness and

hope and that He may grant Muslims all over the world happiness and blessings. I also pray to Almighty Allah to grant them success, guide them to reunite their ranks and strengthen their solidarity.

The month of Ramadan is a month of peace, serenity and security, where Muslims are particularly fervent in fulfilling their prayers, worshipping and soul purification. While some of us find in Ramadan a time to feel secure and serene, it is distressing for me to say that corners of the Islamic world were deprived of this serenity and peace, while some other parts are currently

undergoing various forms of misery and harsh conditions, especially in Syria where aspects of human suffering as reflected by the absence of basic necessities of life, lack of security, increasing disturbances, continued violations of human rights, the killing and displacement have become an everyday fact of life.

We pray to Almighty Allah that this year's Eid Al-Fitr would represent a glimpse of hope for the Syrians, and that their plight will come to an end so that they can regain their normal lives in a context of peace and stability. Our brothers, the Rohingya minority in Myanmar, are also still



suffering from flagrant violations which threaten their very existence in that country. I call once again on Muslims from all around the world to make every effort to help our Muslim brothers in Myanmar overcome their plight.

On this happy occasion, we reaffirm our support for our Palestinian brothers and confirm the firm stance of the Muslim Ummah concerning the city of Al-Quds, and the need to preserve its Arab and Islamic identity against the risk of "Judaization" and to put an end to occupation.

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obligatory duty, thereafter they set forth to Eid prayer-ground, raising their voice in prayer to me. I swear by my Honour, by my Grandeur, by my grace and by my Exalted position, that I shall surely answer the prayers of those people. Thereafter Allah addresses the people, go forth, I have forgiven your sins, and have replaced

your evil deeds with righteous ones. Those people then turn from the prayer ground in such a condition that their sins stand forgiven" (Sunan Al-Baihaqi).

Here we should also note the importance of fasting during the month of Shawwal, as prophet saw said: "He who observes the fasts in the month of Ramadan, and also observes fasts for six

days in the month of Shawwal, it is as if he has observed fasts for the whole year."(Muslim).

Fasting in the month of Ramadhan is an excellent deed, and attending the Traweeh prayer is a very good practice, but it is not good enough to mark our identity as Muslim. A Muslim, a true believer is one who realizes the importance of application of Shariah on the basis of day to day life, and on the basis of each and every moment. As muslim we are bound by the rules of Islam, which means we have to pass our life in accordance with the Ouran and Sunnah. A life will only be considered a successful one if it was lived in conformity to the commandment of Allah and the way shown by Rasulullah saw; he has set

up a pattern, and established a modal and example, as how a muslim's life purpose and objective of it. The Holy Quran proclaims: "Indeed you have a fair example in the messenger of Allah, for whosoever hopes for Allah and the last day and remembers Allah

should be. And also told in details the much" (33: 21.



So by the departure of Ramadhan we should not depart our good deeds and Amal as well, and wait for the next Ramadhan to come and then start an other lot. We rather should be a practicing muslim by practicing the religion in every sphere of life at all time.

We must note here one of the most significant points, which is that we are living in a society where it is very difficult to maintain our Islamic entity and religious dignity. As the entire environment is in contrary to what we believe. Therefore the only place where we can safeguard our faith is the mosque and the environment of the mosque. So we should have a strong connection with the mosque, and make it the focal

point of our thought and activities, such as Attending the prayers in congregation, joining the Islamic activities held there, bringing the friends and family and spending some time in it.

The mosque was and is still the school of this nation, the university

> and the source of all virtues. Students are taught in it, and children braught up in it, and scholars graduated from it. Today we are in disparate need to reaffirm the role of the mosque and its message. Because the mosque is the house of Allah in which His faithful slaves are honored. and the spiritual enlightment and honor and dignity emit. It fills our heart with joy to see the mosque crowded with young people, who represent the bright future of our community.

In order to instill a sound style of life in accordance with Islamic Shariah, the prophet saw said: "every new born is naturally predisposed as a Muslim. However, his parents are the one who make him a Jew. a Christian or magus". Hence when a child is brought up with deep belief in Allah, he/she will eventually acquire good and sound culture as an adult. This is one of the unique characteristics of Islam as a religion of mercy and peace.

We have forgotten that we are believers in our creators the Almighty Allah and his beloved messenger Mohammad saw, we have forgotten that we are believers in the day of judgment and the life in the Hereafter. We have become unmindful of our

duty to show the world by example that the solution to all problems lies in our beautiful religion Islam. Jus to give you an example of its golden teaching that the Islam instruct its followers to curb their hand and tongue from evil, and not to do bad in return to bad, but to do the best in return to the worst, not for fear from any one, but rather for fear from Allah Alone.

But where we are from this teaching? Just what percentage of the muslims practice Islam in their homes, businesses, social gatherings and relationships? We should measure ourselves in the light of Quran and Sunnah as to where do we stand. We call ourselves muslim and follower of prophet Mohammad saw. Does Islam reflects on our daily life? Do we ever think as a muslim what our duties are? Moreover we always look for some excuse to avoid the religious obligation. Slight flue and cold or minor headache becomes an excuse to leave the prayers even inside the house. Jobs and personal commitments ar being considered as valid reasons to stay behind the congregational prayers. Whereas as at the same time all our worldly affairs are normal and go well. The only thing which is effected by is the religious obligations.

If the salt has run out we have time and strength to drive the car to the supermarket to purchase it, likewise if the milk is finished we are available to drive to the dairy to buy it. Similarly if we are feeling bored inside the house we have plenty of time to go to parks and walk around streets and shops. But when it comes the issue of prayers and religious obligations we pretend very busy and find ourselves overwhelmed and

tightened with the time.

How long are we going to continue like this? How long are we going to offer flimsy excuse? Knowing that Allah swt is well aware of every thing, hidden or exposed, we can deceive each other, but we can never deceive the All knowing Allah, He is fully aware of our situation.

All this happens because we have very little faith in Allah and the Hereafter, consequently it becomes very difficult to fulfil the religious obligation, which is the only beneficial in the Hereafter. On the other hand we have very strong faith in this world. That is why dealing with the worldly matter is very easy.

One should be proud of his or her religion, and must recognize the favour of

Allah that He has given us through this religion. let us have a close look of ibn Hisham, one of the propet's earliest biographer has recorded how Jafar Tayyar ra described to Negus the king of Abyssinia the message of Islam and the preaching of its prophet while explaining to the Ethiopian king, the spokesman of the small band of Muslim immigrants from Makkah, did not say that the prophet saw performed miracles, or devoted most of his time in meditation, prayers and fasting, as these where present in other heavenly religions in one or the other shape. All he said was that: "The makkans were an ignorant folk who worshipped idols, ate flesh of dead animals, tormented their neighbours, inflicted cruelty on brothers. The powerful allowed all the injustice to the powerless. Till a man appeared among them.... who taught them to give up idol worship, speak the

truth, stop shedding each others blood, refrain from misappropriating the belongings of orphans, look after the comforts of neighbours, and abstain from accusing chaste women of infidelity. Therefore we trusted him and believed in him. (Seerah Nabaviah vol 1 p/ 372).

Let us conclude this by a saying of the prophet saw, in which he admonished a man: "Take advantage of five (by doing good deeds and making amends for the bad ones) before an other five befall you. Take advantage of your youth before you grow old, your health before you become ill, your wealth before you become poor, your free time before you become busy, and your life before it is time for you to die" (Musnad Ahmad, Hakim).

We should also not forget on this auspicious occasion our less fortunate brothers and sister in many parts of the world who are going through hardship and difficult time, and ask Allah SWT with a sincere heart to release them from all calamities and suffering, and give them a happy and peaceful life. And may this Eid bring for them an end to all disaster and sorrow. Ameen.

On this happy occasion I would like to extend my warmest and heartfelt greetings to all Muslims, and congratulate them for having strived to fulfil this honourable obligation of fasting and praying. And we wish you a very happy and blessed Eid.

We beseech Allah SWT to accept all our good deeds, and forgive the shortcomings, (Ameen).



OIC urges ending violations at Jerusalem holy sites

Jeddah, 05 Shawwal 23 August (IINA) – The Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) reaffirmed the safety of the holy sites at Jerusalem is of paramount importance to all Muslims, and is an integral part of peace and security in the region.

In a statement issued on the occasion of the 43rd anniversary of the attempt to burn the Al-Aqsa Mosque, OIC urged the international community to force Israel to abide by international law, and cease its violations against the occupied city and respect its holy sites. The statement said that the anniversary comes amid continued Israeli violations and repeated desecrations of the forecourts of the blessed first "Qibla" by Israeli extremists, and growing calls by extremists for the destruction of the Mosque and the erection of the alleged temple in its place.

The anniversary also comes at a time when the occupied city of Al-Quds is being subjected to a systematic campaign of ethnic cleansing designed to drive out its indigenous population and replace them by, in grave breach of international law.

OIC said that Israel, the occupying power, bears full responsibility for the safety of the holy places it occupies, knowing that International agreements and treaties, especially the Fourth Geneva Convention prohibit the occupying state from committing acts of aggression against holy places or denying worshippers access to these places. The Convention also bans the alteration of the landmarks of the city, population composition and urban structure, or any aggression against its historical monuments

Given continued Israeli violations against the city, the OIC, whose creation was the direct outcome of the issue of Jerusalem, calls on the international community to force Israel, the occupying power, to abide by international law, and cease its violations against the occupied city and respect its holy sites. The OIC reaffirmed the consistent position of the Islamic Ummah vis-à-vis Jerusalem and the protection of its Arab and Islamic identity, and renews its call on member states to continue all forms of support and assistance to Jerusalem, guided by the Strategic Sector Plan, which sets out the priority sectors to be financed in the city.

Smoking at Iftar highly dangerous: Experts

Dubai, Ramadan 07 26 July (IINA) – The first puff of smoke immediately after ending the fast is capable of killing a person, doctors said while urging Muslimsmokers to use the opportunity to quit the habit this Ramadan.

Smoking can be dangerous for a fasting person whose body is trying to recoup after abstaining from water and food for so long. Smokers must consider themselves lucky if they do not contract serious cardiovascular problem, experts said. "Smoking is the worst thing a person can do to his body, especially at Iftar in Ramadan," said Dr Riaz Ahmad Minhas, an expert in internal medicine at the Emirates Clinic and Medical Centre in Al Ain. At this time, he said, the body is in greater need of liquids, glucose, and oxygen and smoking could lead to the contraction of blood vessels, preventing the required flow of oxygen. Smoking at such a critical time can also cause the blood to thicken. This can lead to the blockage of arteries, increase blood pressure, spasms (congestion of arteries), disturb regular heartbeat, and increase cholesterol. "It could be lethal and smokers must be aware of that, Gulf News reported quoting Dr Minhas as saving.

Dr Ali Jaffar, a physician in Al Ain, said inhalation of tobacco at the ending of a fast is highly

injurious to the human body. People do not know how hard it is for their bodies to withstand such a blow at such a time. "If they knew they wouldn't be so cruel to their own bodies," he added. A majority of smokers reach for a cigarette immediately after ending the fast. They like to have a cigarette after eating a date or a glass of water. As soon as they eat something their body starts demanding nicotine. "People with weaker willpower must seek medical assistance to control the nicotine withdrawal, he said.

Dr Jaffar also advised smokers to at least refrain from smoking at Iftar until their bodies return to normal. A smoker must take light but nutritious food and proper rest. He said Ramadan is a golden opportunity for smokers to quit the habit. The doctors said nicotine and tar are the most damaging substances in a cigarette. "It's extremely harsh for the human stomach to tolerate them after a day-long emptiness," they said.

Research all over the world has proved without doubt that smoking is responsible for an endless list of health problems and ailments such as weakness of the body, shortness of breath and impotency. Smokers often suffer from pain in their legs while walking or cycling as smoking gradually narrows their blood vessels.

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Obama hosts Iftar at White House

Washington, 24 Ramadan 12 August (IINA) – While hosting his fourth Iftar dinner Friday night at the White House, President Barack Obama reaffirmed the freedom of religion and the right to worship as the foremost freedom in America. Several prominent figures from the American Muslim community and senior US officials took part in the Iftar held in the State Dining

Room of the White House.

In his speech, Obama expressed his commitment to defending the freedom of religion. "It's enshrined in the First Amendment of our Constitution - the law of the land, always and forever. It beats in our heart - in the soul of the people who know

that our liberty and our equality is endowed by our Creator," Obama said. His speech comes just after the Mitt Romney presidential campaign released an advertisement saying that Obama is threatening religious freedom in the country. "Who shares your values?" the ad asks. "President Obama used his health care plan to declare war on religion, forcing religious institutions to go against their faith. Mitt Romney believes that's wrong. "When religious freedom is threatened, who do you want to stand with?"

The ad was attacking Obama over the Health and Human Services mandate that employers cover contraception and sterilization in their employees' health insurance. Religious institutions, such as hospitals and colleges, are not exempt from the mandate. Both Catholics and evangelicals are protesting the mandate for violating their religious freedom.

On another note, Obama also honored several guests attending the White House dinner, including Huma Abedin, close aide to U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton. Obama thanked Abedin for her tireless work and for representing the U.S. and its democratic values.



He said Abedin, who has been at Clinton's side in the White House, the Senate, her 2008 Democratic campaign against Obama and in her globe-trotting travels at the State Department, had worked tirelessly to represent the United States. Clinton has relied on Abedin's expertise and "so have I", the president added. "The American people owe her a debt of gratitude – because Huma is an American patriot, and an example of what we need in this country - more public servants with her sense of decency, her grace and her generosity of spirit. "So, on behalf of all Americans, we thank you so much," Obama told Abedin.

She was born in Kalamazoo, Michigan in 1976 but moved with her family to Saudi Arabia when she was two. Her father was born in India under British rule and her mother is Pakistani. Abedin has been the target of a small group of Republican lawmakers, including former presidential candidate Michele Bachmann. Abedin was mentioned in a June letter written by Bachmann and her colleagues for possible association with the Muslim Brotherhood. Bachmann wrote the letter to the

deputy inspector general of the State Department alleging the conspiracy and demanding a probe. The letter was denounced by several Republicans including Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.) who said "Huma represents what is best about America: the daughter of immigrants, who has risen to the

highest levels of our government on the basis of her substantial personal merit and her abiding commitment to the American ideals that she embodies so fully."

Republican Senator John McCain spoke strongly in her defense, saying she was a devoted public servant full of "decency, warmth and good humor". "Put simply, Huma represents what is best about America: the daughter of immigrants, who has risen to the highest levels of our government on the basis of her substantial personal merit," McCain said. Members of Congress, including Minnesota Congresswoman Bachmann, wrote a letter to the deputy inspector general of the State Department alleging the conspiracy and demanding a probe.

OIC chief slams global inaction on Rohingya Muslims

Jeddah, 07 August (IINA) – The Secretary General of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) Professor Ekmeleddin Ihsanoglu expressed disappointment over the inaction of the international community to stop the massacres, injustice and ethnic cleansing perpetrated by the Myanmar government against Rohingya Muslims in the Arakan region.

In his speech at the extraordinary meeting of the OIC Executive Committee on this issue on Sunday, Ihsanoglu explained the steps being taken by OIC to protect Muslim minority in Myanmar. He said that the neglect of the rights of Rohingyas by the international community and the lack of unity among Rohingya organizations spurred the OIC to exert earnest efforts to unite these organizations for the first time at the OIC headquarters in May 2011.

The OIC General Secretariat had directed its offices at the United Nations in New York to coordinate with its member states which are also non-permanent members of the UN Security Council (Azerbaijan, Morocco, Pakistan and Togo) to urge the Council to consider the plight of the Rohingyan minorities, he noted.

The secretary general proposed at the meeting to condemn the continued repression and ethnically-motivated oppression of the Rohingyan Muslims as well as to demand restoration of their legitimate rights and request member states, particularly those with representation with the Myanmar government, to do all within their means to convince the Myanmar government to repeal the arbitrary 1982 Citizenship Law which led to withdrawal of citizenship from Rohingyan Muslims.

Ihsanoglu also urged countries, especially Myanmar's neighboring countries, as well as Islamic organizations and bodies to provide urgent assistance to the Rohingyan Muslims. He proposed that the Islamic Group in Geneva should dispatch and urgent request to the Human Rights Council to send a fact-finding mission to investigate the massive violation perpetrated against the Muslims inhabitants of Arakan.

The OIC Secretary General also proposed that setting up of an Islamic fact-finding committee on the events should be considered, and that a report in that regard should be submitted to the next ministerial conference. He also proposed

Study: Southeast Asian Muslims most devout

Jakarta, 28 August (IINA) – Southeast Asia's Muslims can be confident that when it comes to some key beliefs they are among the most devout in the world.

A survey, carried out by Pew Research Center, focusing on the values, rituals and lifestyles of more than 35,000 Muslims around the world showed that the Muslims of Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand were often among the most enthusiastic followers of some of the five pillars of Islam: the declaration of faith, prayer, alms giving, fasting during Ramadan and going on a pilgrimage to Makkah. The survey, which included about 5,000 people from the region, showed that believers in Southeast Asia were more enthusiastic than those in Africa, Asia, Europe and even the Middle East in upholding most of these pillars.

Some 98% of Indonesians said they gave alms annually, followed by 93% of Malaysians and Thais. Those were among the three highest rates for charity in the world. In most other Muslim communities, less than 80% of those surveyed participated in what is called zakat. "Annual almsgiving, which by custom is

supposed to equal approximately 2.5% of a person's total wealth, is almost as widely observed as fasting during Ramadan," the report released earlier this month said. "În Southeast Asia and South Asia, the median of roughly nine-in-ten Muslims say they performed zakat." This corner of Asia also outperformed when it came to fasting during Ramadan. While most of the Muslim world enthusiastically embraces the ritual of fasting during the holy month, 99% of Malaysians and Indonesians surveyed said they did. In Asia, only Thai Muslims were more devout, with 100% of them saving they fasted.

In Indonesia, mosque attendance is also among the highest in the world. The Pew report said 72% of Indonesians surveyed said they went to a mosque at least once a week. That compares to just 57% in Malaysia, 61% in Egypt and 44% in Turkey. Southeast Asia ranked a bit lower when it came to daily prayers. More than 75% of those surveyed said they prayed several times a day, which is well above the average for most of Asia and the Middle East, but below most African countries. Few of the Muslims surveyed had made it to Mecca yet: Only 6% of Southeast

Asians, compared to 17% in the Middle East and northern Africa.

Interestingly, belief in angels is highest in Southeast Asia, with 99% of Indonesian Muslims, 98% of Malaysian Muslims and 91% of Thai Muslims believing in them. Belief in powerful angels may be why few in the region think they need lucky charms. On average, Southeast Asian Muslims were among the biggest believers in witchcraft but at the same time the least likely to believe in using talismans to ward off evil or misfortune.

While around 40% of the Muslims surveyed in Pakistan and Albania believed in the protective power of charms, amulets or precious stones, less than 5% of Southeast Asian Muslims said they would use them. "In all countries surveyed, a majority of Muslims report that they do not use magical objects to ward off evil or misfortune," the report said. "Indeed, in 21 of 23 countries where the question was asked, fewer than three-in ten Muslims say they wear talismans or precious stones for protection
